Abreu, Zequinha - 1880-1935 Brazilian

- 1. Tico Tico 1917 is a choro originally "Tico-Tico no Farelo" (sparrow in the bran) or "Tico-Tico no Fubá" (sparrow in the cornmeal)
- 2. Choro: Popular street music syncopation and counterpoint Late 19<sup>th</sup> century – Rio de Janeiro, Afro-european mix. Considered by many to be authentic Brazilian music
  - 3. Flute, guitar and cavaquinho (similar to a small guitar upper 4 strings) sometimes flute, tambourine, various guitar-like instruments
  - 4. Because it was street music, he didn't write it down. There are many arrangements for many combinations.
  - 5. 3 plus 3 plus 2 rhythm akin to Habanera or Son Clave rests and accents matter, especially the accents in bars 4 and 12.
